These figures are an enigma, for their function is unclear and no other examples are known. They are, nevertheless, stylistically of interest in that the head form, with arching crest and chin, corresponds to certain old Hawaiian wood images (see Cox and Davenport, 1974: 135, 141, 166-7) and the posture, though unusual, can be seen in an early illustration of female dancers (Choris, 1822: pl. xvi). They may be the 'one-off' creation of an artist in the early decades of the nineteenth century, or possibly a result of the traditionalist revival which took place in Hawaii in the 1880s during King David Kalakaua's reign (see Rose, 1980: 215).

The hollow bases are each pierced twice, presumably for attachment, though whether to a staff or kahili handle is not certain. However, probable saw marks can be detected on the base of the larger figure and the possibility that they are not authentic Hawaiian objects cannot be discounted.
