This rare pendant is pierced through the neck, has no provenance, but is comparable to antler
figurines which were excavated from Dutch Hollow, a Seneca site in northwest New York State,
dating to about ad 1600 (Mason, 1981:381). The Seneca were the westernmost of the Iroquois
confederation, living to the south of Lake Ontario.
