SESSION:	The Sainsbury Centre: Space, Bodies, Light

DESCRIPTION:	This lecture introduces the Sainsbury Centre building itself as an artwork that we can consider and critique.
	Commissioned in 1974 and opened in 1978, the Centre was built to house the donation of Robert and Lisa Sainsbury's collection to the then-new University of East Anglia. Robert and Lisa Sainsbury selected a little-known architect: Norman Foster, now Lord Foster of Millbank and one of the most respected of architects working today.
	In this lecture, we will not only explore the building's role as a physical space for housing art, but also consider some of the more conceptual elements of Foster's design, in particular the way it shapes the human sensory experience: light and dark, warm and cool, open and closed. In so doing, we will introduce an exciting approach to considering architecture in relation to the human body, a method that can be applied to any building past and present around the world.
